Drug Crime. Introduction. Sociologist Colin Bell, then-convenor of the Scottish Consortium on Crime and Criminal Justice (SCCCJ), commented in the Consortiums Report on Drugs and Crime that drug abuse is ^above all, a deeply entrenched social problem with serious consequences for public health and justice. Indeed, drug misuse is estimated to have a total economic and social cost to Scotland of £3.5 billion a year.

As a 2007 report from the Scottish Drugs Forum points out, the “drugs-crime link is not straightforward”. It states that “three explanations have been put forward for this”: 1. In 2002 about a quarter of convicted property and drug offenders in local jails had committed their crimes to get money for drugs, compared to 5% of violent and public order offenders. Among state prisoners in 2004 the pattern was similar, with property (30%) and drug offenders (26%) more likely to commit their crimes for drug money than ...

There are high rates of substance use within the criminal justice system. 85% of the prison popu. lation has an active substance use disorder or were incarcerated for a crime involving drugs or drug use. Inmates with opioid use disorder are at a higher risk for overdose following release from incarceration.
